 Steve Hambrecht fished the Townsville Classic and was part of the winning team in Boats under 7.5m (see article)

- Jim and Ryan McKinnon (Galaxy II) and new members Keli and Jhiel Pepene (Ika-Nui) fished the Harvey Bay Competition in October and Jhiel won the champion junior award, with a Black Marlin and Cobia, which was a fantastic effort in his first gamefishing competition.
- Paul and the kids (Black Habit) and Mark Anning and kids (Kyrani) fished the SCGFC Spring Shoot-out, and Charlotte Ditchfield caught the first billfish for the tournament (also her first Sailfish) and was runner-up senior ladies angler congratulations.
- Charlotte Ditchfield and Mitch Perry both had tagged fished recaptured. Charlotte's was a Yellowfin Tuna (2kg) that was re-caught in New Caledonia after 803 days and had grown to 25kg. Mitch's tagged Black Marlin off the Gold Coast was captured only 5 NM away, 30 days later, indicating that whilst the bait sticks around the fish will continue to stay and feed in the area.

On the fishing front, the small Black Marlin, Mahi Mahi, Wahoo, Yellowfin Tuna and Mackerel have all turned up in good numbers between Sunny to Gold Coast. Our members' have been catching good fish off Pt. Lookout in December, so now is the time to get out there whilst the fish are around and weathers good. To all skippers and anglers, remember to get your Activity and Capture sheets and Tag cards back to Secretary ASAP for entry into the database.

Our premier fishing Tournament, "Back 2 Tangas 8" has been scheduled for the 4-6th March 2016, a couple of weeks earlier than normal due to Easter. It would be great to see a large turnout of members, so please put the dates in your diary. 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TOWNSVILLE BILLFISH CHALLENGE

MBGFC Part of the Winning Team at Townsville Billfish Challenge

Moreton Bay Game Fishing Club members regularly participate in a range of QGFA sanctioned competitions throughout the year. They recently continued their tradition of competition success when club member Steve Hambrecht travelled to Townsville to compete in the 33^{rd} Townsville Billfish Challenge conducted between $2^{nd}-5^{th}$ September.

Steve was part of the crew that took out the title for boats under 7.5m at this year's Townsville 4 day Billfish Challenge. Skippered by good mate, Michael Parisi of TGFC the crew of *TROPHY* worked hard over the 4 day competition.

The bite was anything but aggressive with Steve having to continuously feed line to one fussy Sailfish before it finally hooked up after no less than 5 attempts. **TROPHY** managed a Sailfish on day 1 and 2, before grinding it out over the final tension filled two days to take the under 7.5m title on count back.

The small Black Marlin of recent years were all but absent, with Sailfish dominating the catch in a throwback to the 'good old days' where they used to frequent Cape Bowling Green in big numbers.

In all 22 Sailfish and 7 Black Marlin were tagged by the fleet of 24 boats over four long days of fishing.

The weather was definitely more suited to the big boats at times during the competition, but what limited the catch was the dirty water that moved in to several of the usual "go to spots" on day 3 and 4.

Cool Change took out the category for boats over 7.5m with 1 Black Marlin and 4 Sailfish tagged over the 4 days proving popular winners amongst the 95 competitors that participated in the Competition.


The 2014/15 season has been another exciting season for the NSW DPI Game Fish Tagging Program, with over 10,900 tag returns and 130 fish reported as being recaptured. To the right is a map of all tag returns of released fish for the 14/15 season under the program.

Sailfish Recaptures

A number of sailfish recaptures have been reported in the Northern Territory as anglers from the Groote Eylandt GFC



continue to fish the seasonal inshore bite. One sailfish released



on the 12th of October 2013 by Groote Eylandt G & SFC vessel Determined was recently recaptured another Groote Eylandt G & SFC vessel No More Favors. No More Favours recaptured the sailfish approximately 1 nautical mile from its original release location after a lengthy 749 days at liberty. The sailfish grew from an estimated 130cm and 15kg to and estimated 190cm and 30kg. The fish was rereleased in excellent condition. A second Groote Eylandt GFC sailfish recapture was reported by No More Favours who caught a fish released by anglers fishing aboard Delerious on 8th of October 2015, the sailfish, estimated by both anglers at 180cm & 20kg, spent 7 days at liberty before being recaptured and re-released.

Striped Marlin Recapture

A striped marlin released by Bermagui GFC vessel Black Widow has recently been

reported as recaptured by QLD longline vessel, Straight Shooter. The striped marlin was released off Bermagui, NSW, on the 22nd of January 2015 and was estimated at 70kg after a brief tussle. After 271 days at liberty the marlin was recaptured wide off Coffs Harbour, NSW, having travelled a straight line distance of approximately 550 nautical miles prior to being recaptured. It is another interesting striped marlin recapture that has



occurred as a result of the great striped marlin fishing experienced on the South Coast of NSW earlier in the year.

Port Stephens Black Marlin Swims to South Pacific

A black marlin released on the 28th of February 2015 off Port Stephens, NSW has been reported as recaptured by a local fisherman off the Malaita Province, Solomon Islands. The NSW DPI Tagging Program was recently contacted with news of the

recapture by the tag recovery officer at the Secretariat of the Pacific Community (SPC).

Some of the recapture details provided to the SPC by the fisherman were unclear, specifically the exact date of recapture, however it is thought that it was caught during the month of May, 2015. The fish was confirmed as caught using a lure and was estimated at 3 meters total length having originally been released at an estimated 70kg. Images of the tag were provided to DPI for further verification of the catch.

The fish was recaptured approximately 1530 nautical miles from its original release location.



Mahi-Mahi

The warm East Australian Current that flows into southern NSW is beginning to strengthen, bringing with it pelagic fish species such as marlin and mahi-mahi. Fishing for mahi-mahi on Fish Aggregating Devices (FADs) during summer is a popular and consistent type of fishing. All FADs have now been deployed on the NSW coastline for the up-coming summer season, locations can be found at the below link:

Now is a great time to remind anglers wishing to tag mahi-mahi that all fish tagged are to be over 60cm in length. Mahi-mahi are to be tagged with the yellow pelagic tags only. These tags are designed to be locked behind the small bones that support the fishes dorsal fins known as the "pterygiophores" as pictured below. If the tag is inserted incorrectly into the muscle in the dorsal area, without locking in behind the bony structure, it is very likely that the tag will be rejected by the fish.

Images below demonstrate incorrect tagging, with tags soon to be shed.





The image to the right shows correct tagging technique as the head of the tag is located between the spines that radiate off the dorsal fin.

This ensures the tag is locked securely in place and will remain in the fish for the duration of its lifetime.

As with all tagging, it is important that anglers record all fields on the provided tag cards as accurately. This can be difficult to do whilst fishing, but is vital to ensure the accurate collection of data.

Scallop Spoons

250g fresh baby scallops

- 4 rashers of proscuittio, chopped finely
- 1 mango, finely diced
- 1 small red onion, finely diced
- 1 small handful of fresh basil, finely sliced
- 1 fresh red chilli, finely diced
- 2 teaspoons fresh grated ginger
- Juice of 2 limes
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 iceberg lettuce

Mix the mango, red onion, basil, chilli, ginger, lime juice and olive oil in a bowl and set aside. Place the scallops and pancetta on an oiled medium heat barbecue plate.

Cook the proscuittio until crispy and the scallops for only a couple of minutes. Do not overcook them. Mix the scallops and pancetta with the remaining ingredients and place into small iceberg lettuce leaves. Use the leaves from the centre of the lettuce because are crunchy and hold the filling well. Season with pepper and sea salt.

Makes approximately eight.

- 1. Fish must be captured or tagged in accordance with the MBGFC rules, which will follow the rules of G.F.A.A. MBGFC rules include the following key points;
 - a. A fish gaffed for weighing points cannot subsequently be tagged and released;
 - b. Every effort should be made to release tagged fish in a state where they will survive;
 - c. Capture of game fish species will comply with Qld DPI Fisheries bag limits and minimum/maximum sizes (http://www.daff.qld.gov.au/28_3042.htm);
 - d. All edible fish to be weighed for points may be gilled and gutted on capture and an additional 10% is added to the weight of the fish;
 - e. Sharks (as per Qld Fisheries) "cannot be in possession over 1.5m in length". Sharks under 1.5m can be weighed, however, MBGFC encourages tagging of all sharks;
 - f. Billfish conservation is important for the species and MBGFC promotes tag and release of all billfish, unless the fish is likely to be a record;
 - g. All QGFA, GFAA, IGFA potential records claims must comply with GFAA rules.
- 2. MBGFC fishing grounds are "Queensland local" waters which is defined as a line east of Point Danger (Qld/NSW border in the south) and a line east of Double Island Point (in the north).
- 3. Light tackle (1 to 10kg) line test may be used in all waters.
- 4. Heavy tackle (15 60kg) can only be used in waters greater than 100m in depth.
- 5. Fish captures or tagging will only be accepted by MBGFC only if;
 - a. Claims are submitted on the Club's capture notification form on which all details are recorded;
 - b. Is submitted together with appropriate completed NSW DPI Tag Card for tagged fish;
 - c. Is submitted to the Club Secretary, P.O. Box 371, Capalaba, Qld 4157;
 - d. Is received by the Club Secretary no later than one month after capture/tagging.
- 6. Members are encouraged to support scientific investigation by Fisheries Authorities.
- 7. Sportsman ship and consideration to others should be the mark of MBGFC members.
- 8. All boat skippers have a duty of care to ensure their vessels are seaworthy, insured and safety of the vessel and crews are first consideration.

MBGFC CLUB POINTS

Capture points listed for Billfish apply only for captures in excess of following: Marlin (Blue, Black, Broadbill Swordfish) – 100kg, Marlin (Striped) – 75kg, Sailfish – 35kg. Points halved below these weights.

MBGFC - CLUB HOUSE AND LAND RULES

MORETON BAY GAME FISH CLUB LTD. MORETON ISLAND CLUB HOUSE AND LAND RULES

Effective 15th July 2015

1. All members wishing to use the Club facilities must notify the Secretary to obtain approval. Approval will only be considered if the Member has already signed a "Application for permission of MBGFC Ltd to enter upon land at Moreton Island" Form 37 for the current financial year or lodging an application. If applicant is under age of 18 years the application must be signed by both the applicant and a legal guardian. Each person staying at the Club land must sign a separate form. Club Land is for the use of members and their immediate family only (i.e. partner and children). Members may invite guests to stay at the club land on a one off introduction basis (fill in Form 37a). These guests would be expected to join the club if revisiting.

2. **FEES** are payable in advance are:

Members Tent Sites: \$35.00 per night includes 2 adults & 2 children plus \$10.00 per extra adult and \$5.00

per extra child on the same site.

Guests Tent Sites: \$45.00 per night includes 2 adults & 2 children plus \$10.00 per extra adult and \$5.00

per extra child on the same site.

Caravan: \$50.00 per night includes 2 adults & 2 children plus \$10.00 per extra adult and \$5.00

per extra child.

Moorings: Use of moorings is free for club members but if clubhouse facilities (showers & BBQ

etc.) are used, a fee of \$10.00 per day per person will apply.

- 3. **BOOKINGS** will only be accepted through the Club Secretary; but fees must be paid in advance: Postal: P.O. Box 371, Capalaba QLD 4157 Email: admin@mbgfc.com.au
- 4. **ACCESS TO LAND AND USE OF VEHICLES AND TRAILERS:** All access is via the access roads only. No vehicles or trailers are to be driven on Club Land (except for unloading & loading) and all Members are requested to park vehicles in an orderly fashion allowing room for others.
- 5. **SHOWERS AND TOILETS**: Members are requested to hose out these areas daily and to use the stainless steel troughs to wash sand off feet before entering.
- 6. BARBECUES: The barbecues are to be cleaned well after use including drip trays and burners.
- 7. **KITCHEN**: The facilities are available and all refrigeration and freezer units are to be left open when no longer in use and power is to be turned off. All kitchen utensils, counters, fridges and floors must be cleaned upon departure from the Club Land. Hot water system to be left on standby upon departing Club Land.
- 8. **GENERATOR SHED and POWER**: Generator is to be run morning (3 hours) and evenings only (sunset till 10 pm) latest. See instructions for turning on and off. The generator shed is not to be used for storage of anything whatsoever. If possible bring diesel across for Genset and put into 200L drums club will reimburse receipts.
- 9. WATER: Numerous taps are located around Club Land. Please use the sprinklers when possible.
- 10. **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS**: Members are requested to spend a little time carrying out any maintenance needed, if it is within their capabilities. Any damaged or broken facilities to be reported promptly to a committee member or Club Secretary. All facilities to be cleaned, and locked up upon departure and keys returned to Club Secretary promptly. Welcome to assist with gardening and site upkeep for the benefit of all and preservation of the area.
- 11. **FIREWOOD and PETS**: Moreton Island is a declared National Park and the cutting and gathering of wood is prohibited. Pets are prohibited on Moreton Island and hence on Club Land.
- 12. **RUBBISH**: All rubbish is to be removed from Club Land either to the public dump at Cowan or taken off the island. Fish are only to be cleaned on the outside stainless steel bench and thoroughly cleaned after use. All frames and gut are to be immediately disposed of in the sea, but not in area immediately in front of Club Land.
- 13. **VEHICLE PERMITS:** Permits must be obtained to take your vehicle on Moreton Island.
- 14. **ABUSE OF RULES**: Committee Members have the authority to ask any tenants or visitors on Club property to leave should any abuse of the above rules occur. The Committee will act on such matter.

NEW GENERATOR STARTING AND STOPPING PROCEDURES

Starting

- 1. Unlock shed and do a visual check for oil/radiator leaks or damaged pipes etc.
- 2. Check the oil level, the dip stick has a yellow top.
- 3. Check the water in radiator, when engine is COLD, top up fluids using the radiator fluid or if none available clean fresh water.
- 4. Check the fuel in generator, it is a brass coloured cap, this must be filled daily as it is on a small tank. Fill from the 200L Drums to 20L jerry can via funnel or pump from Green 200L drum (generator tank will only run for 15 hours).
- 5. Turn the ignition key on and then press and hold the green button on panel until the engine starts.
- 6. Switch the three large breakers "on" they are pushed "up" for on.
- 7. Power is now running.
- 8. Close shed door.

Shut Down.

- 1. Unlock shed and do a visual check for oil/radiator leaks or damaged pipes etc.
- 2. Switch the three large breakers "off" into the down position.
- 3. Turn the generator ignition key to off position. Generator will stop.
- 4. Refill the fuel in generator, it is a brass coloured cap, this must be filled daily as it is on a small tank. Fill from Green 200L drum.
- 5. Close shed door and lock up.

DO NOT RUN GENERATOR OUT OF FUEL

THE HOT WATER SYSTEM

Should be left on at all times.

When arriving remove the cover from the hot water system and turn the knob from vacation to hot, the pilot light will ignite the main burner, refit the cover. When locking up to leave the club again remove the cover and turn the knob on hot water system to vacation. Replace the cover and lock the cage.

SUNDRY

The BBQ gas bottle is kept in the kitchen. When leaving, make sure the grease tray on the BBQ has been cleaned out.

Clean out fridge and wipe out. Use the wet vacuum to suck out the water.

Fridges and 240 volt light switches can be left on, but ensure the 12 volt LED lights are turned off before leaving.

Toilets must be cleaned, rubbish removed and all hoses and tools locked away.

Any breakages or anything that requires maintenance must be reported to the Club Secretary as this will assist to keep on top of repairs.
